LIT SLIDE

- Students are less likely to attend college if loans are seen as a necessity to attending college (Burdman, 2005).
- Early outreach is an opportunity to connect curriculum to careers and show college credentials can be beneficial in their future (Jobs for the Future, 2006).
- Community colleges can be a broker between public schools, four-year colleges, and can even help connect students to business and community resources (Sink & Jackson, 2002; Amey, Eddy, & Ozaki, 2007).
- Partnerships are necessary to provide the services and information they need to succeed in college (Zumeta, Breneman, Callan, & Finney, 2012).
